

Milestones Matter

Your Child at 3 to 4 Years

How your child plays, learns, speaks, acts and moves offers important clues about his or her development.

Your Child's Communication

- Compares things with words like "bigger" or "shorter."
- Tells you a story from a book or video.
- Understands and uses more location words like "inside," "on" and "under."
- Uses words such as "a" or "the" when talking. For example, "a book" or "the dog."
- Pretends to read alone or with others.
- Recognizes signs and logos like STOP.
- Pretends to write or spell and can write some letters.
- Correctly produces "t," "k," "g," "f," "y" and -ing words.
- Says all the syllables in a word.
- Says the sounds at the beginning, middle and end of words.
- Talks smoothly. Does not repeat sounds, words or phrases most of the time.
- Speaks so that people can understand most of what they say. Child may make mistakes on sounds that are later to develop like "i," "j," "r," "sh," "ch," "s," "v" and "th."
- Says all sounds in a consonant cluster containing two or more consonants in a row, like the "tw" in "tweet" or the "nd" in "sand." May not produce all sounds correctly. For example, "spway" for "spray."

Each child develops uniquely, even within the same family, and may meet certain milestones earlier or later then others. If your child does not meet many of the milestones within their age range, or if you have any concerns about your child's hearing or development, it is important to act early. It can make a big difference!

You Can Help Your Child Learn and Grow

Here are some activities to enjoy with your child.

- Sort pictures and objects into categories like food, animals or shapes.
- Read, sing and talk about what you do and where you go. Do this in all the languages you use.
- Read books with a simple story. Talk about the story with your child. Help them retell the story or act it out. Tell them your favorite part of the story and ask for their favorite part.
- Look at family pictures. Have your child tell a story about the picture.
- Help your child understand by asking them questions.
- Act out daily activities like cooking food or going to the doctor.
- Talk to your child in the languages you are most comfortable using. From time to time, your child might use words from their languages in the same sentence or conversation. Don't worry; this is a normal part of becoming bilingual.

You can also use ASHA ProFind (asha.org/profind) to find an ASHA-certified audiologist (asha.org/public/who-are-audiologists) or speech-language pathologist (asha.org/public/who-are-speech-language-pathologists) for an assessment.
